Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 August 2023

The trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditor's report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023. The annual report serves the purposes of both a Directors' report, and a Directors' report under company law.

The academy trust operates an academy for pupils aged 3 to 19 serving a catchment area in Gateshead. It has a pupil capacity of 190 and had a roll of 230 in the school census September 2023.

Commissioned places from Gateshead comprise 170 pre-16 and 20 post 16. All of the pupils at Cedars must have a Statement of Special Educational Needs/Educational Health Care Plan, although it may be possible for this to be drawn up whilst they are in attendance. The Single Plan/Statement have protection in law, and describe the education provision to meet the child's individual need. The Statement/Plan protects the child's individual needs and is formally reviewed at least annually.

Pupils are admitted at any time during the school year, referred via a range of routes. The academy trust works closely with all involved professionals to ensure pupils are correctly placed and that they receive appropriate provision for their needs.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and Aims

The principal objective and activity of the charitable company is the operation of Cedars Academy Trust to provide education for pupils aged 3 to 19 years with physical, sensory and medical needs, speech, language and communication disorders, autism, and a wide range of other complex needs often associated with emotional vulnerability. As a special school we serve the borough of Gateshead with a few out of borough places.

In accordance with the articles of association the charitable company has adopted a 'Scheme of Government' approved by the Secretary of State for Education. The Scheme of Government specified, amongst other things, the basis for admitting students to the academy trust, the catchment area from which the students are drawn, Gateshead, and that the curriculums should comply with the substance of the national curriculum with emphasis on developing skills, knowledge and resilience necessary in adulthood: to create a school that inspires and nurtures creativity and communication and where pupils and staff feel safe and are comfortable within themselves and with each other; and to help develop young people who are confident in and inquisitive of the world around them, who are physically active people, making healthy choices who are confident in a range of environments, who are well prepared for adulthood.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objects and Aims

Our aim is to provide a caring but challenging environment where adults and children feel valued and secure and to provide an education which promotes the growth and development of each individual in our care.

In setting our objectives and planning our activities the trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance and public benefit. The pupils who attend live in and around the borough, with some out of borough pupils also attending.

The academy trust provides education for pupils of different abilities, with additional (special educational) needs. The academy trust has a curriculum satisfying the requirements of section 78 of EA 2002 (balanced and broad curriculum). The academy trust will be at the heart of the community, promoting community cohesion and sharing facilities with other schools and the wider community.

The academy trust offers all pupils a broad and balanced curriculum. Our curriculum is highly individualised, responsive and rich; it is focused on the promotion of communication, emotional development, resilience, and the development of personal and social skills. We place a significant emphasis on enrichment and activity, its positive impact on developing independence, cognitive functioning, emotional literacy, physical & mental health and self-esteem. As students progress through school the focus is on preparation for an extensive range of accredited routes and transition into a range of routes into FE, training or employment.

The main objectives of the academy trust during the year ended 31 August 2023 are as summarised below:

- 1. to improve the Quality of Education received by all our young people
- 2. to improve Access to Learning for all our young people
- 3. to improve our Leadership and Management capabilities across the academy trust
- 4. to improve and develop the accommodation on offer at both sites

The academy trust's main objectives are encompassed in its mission statement: Ours is a community of learning, where secure partnerships create opportunities for students, staff, governors, parents and carers alike to participate and grow to become intellectually, emotionally and socially 'fit for life'.

To this end the objectives and the strategies and activities undertaken to achieve these objectives are all intended to provide the highest quality of education and include:

- I. Improved Communication to develop staff skills, knowledge and confidence in a range of communication and language acquisition strategies and that these are at the core of all curriculum delivery
- 2. Deeper understanding of the teaching and applications of Numeracy where real life acquisition strategies are at the core of all curriculum delivery
- 3. More Creativity a school that truly inspires, nurtures and celebrates creativity
- 4. Better Understanding of the World young people who are confident in and inquisitive of the world around them (Science)
- 5. Understanding Personal, Social and Health Needs People making healthy choices, comfortable within themselves and with each other
- 6. Improved Work Skills Independence Young people who are well prepared for adulthood
- 7. Physical Development Young people making healthy choices, working with others and enjoying physical activity

Public Benefit

The academy trust's aims and achievements are set out within this report and have been undertaken to further its charitable purposes for the public benefit. The trustees have complied with the duty under Section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales and the trustees have considered this guidance in deciding what activities the academy trust should undertake. The academy trust trustees confirm they have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit as published by the Charity Commission in exercising its powers and duties

FUNDRAISING

The Cedars Academy Trust has an active Cedars Charitable Trust (CCT) that oversees fundraising activities and works closely with parents and the school community. Cedars also fundraises with community activities and has wider business links for fund raising initiatives. The Cedars is currently fund raising to create additional teaching and non-teaching (therapeutic and intervention) accommodation.

Achievement and Progress 2022-23

Our assessments for the Summer Term for the Whole School (EYFS-KS3:163 students) show that students made expected or better progress in all areas is similar to the excellent progress recorded in the previous academic year:

- The number of students exceeding or meeting expected progress in English raised slightly to 97% overall.
- 2% drop in the number of students exceeding or meeting expected progress in Maths (96% overall) this
 equates to roughly 1.8 students.
- 3% increase in the number of students exceeding or meeting expected progress in PD (96% overall).

Pupil Premium (84 students) data shows progress in line with that of non-PP peers:

- The percentage of students exceeding or meeting expectations in English increased by 2% at 97% overall.
- 3% decrease in the number of students exceeding or meeting expected progress in Maths (96% overall). This is in line with non-PP peers.
- 5% increase in students exceeding or meeting expectations in Personal Development (95% overall). This is slightly higher than for non-PP peers.

The data for Looked After Children (LAC: 4 students) also shows more students meeting or exceeding expectations in all areas over the year:

- 12% increase in students meeting or exceeding expected progress in English (100% overall).
- Maths remained at 100% of all students making or exceeding expected progress.
- 12% increase in students exceeding or meeting expectations in PSEW (88% overall).

Comparing progress for the Formal Curriculum against the Semi Formal Curriculum

This year, given the higher number of children we have on the semi-formal pathway, we have compared progress of students on the formal pathway with those on the semi-formal, for us to better understand the strengths and areas for development in our curriculum offer.

At first glance, it may appear that students on the formal curriculum (unshaded on the graph) are making very slightly less progress that the semi-formal learners (shaded).

All Students

96% of students on the formal English pathway exceeded or met expectations 98% of students on the semi-formal pathway exceeded or met expectations

96% of students on the formal Maths pathway exceeded or met expectations 96% of students on the semi-formal pathway exceeded or met expectations

94% of students on the formal PD pathway exceeded or met expectations 97% of students on the semi-formal pathway exceeded or met expectations

98% of students on the formal PD pathway exceeded or met expectations 92% of students on the semi-formal pathway exceeded or met expectations

Progress on the Semi-Formal curriculum pathway

In the early part of the academic year, our data suggested that pupils on the semi-formal curriculum pathway were not making the same rates of progress as learners on the formal pathway. This was largely because most learners on the semi-formal pathway have severe learning needs. They do not have learning 'delay', they have severe and multiple cognitive developmental conditions that means learning new things is very difficult and usually happens through repetitive and muti-sensory/modal approaches. Progress for these children will always be relatively slower compared to peers working at National Curriculum levels.

25% of the semi-formal cohort joined Cedars in September 2022. These learners were new to the school (and some to schools altogether) and the first term is usually the most unsettled for them as they begin to lean new routines, make relationships with new adults/peers and adjust to a new environment. The focus on transition means that much time is given to developing emotional and sensory regulation and it takes time for children to become engaged with experiences aimed at developing reading, maths and creativity. Now the children have been in familiar routines for a while, their rates of engagement and progress in all areas of the curriculum is showing excellent improvement.

We developed and introduced a new assessment framework for the Semi-Formal pathway to help our teaching teams accurately assess and record progress at the earliest stages of development.

The data for Summer Term has shown that giving time for gaining familiarity with staff and routines, lots of repetition, tailored sensory approaches and lots and lots of consolidation is very effective as outcomes have improved significantly.

Progress across the Formal curriculum pathway

The number of children meeting and exceeding expectations in **Communication and English** continues to be strong. The newly implemented **Read Write Inc.** programme continues to show good results throughout the school.

The **Talk Boost** intervention continues to show excellent results in developing communication skills. We have been delighted with the success of this programme. Other Specialist schools are now visiting us to look at how we run the programme as we have shared our evidence at the Federation of Leaders Of Specialist Education (FLSE).

The number of children meeting and exceeding expectations in **Maths** also continues to be strong. Teaching teams have a good understanding of the needs of their groups and are able to use a range of strategies and resources to carefully scaffold new concepts and are taking time to practice and consolidate key knowledge and skills before moving on to more abstract ideas. The 10% gap in Personal Development between students in receipt of Pupil Premium on the Semi-Formal pathway and Pupil Premium Students on the Formal curriculum in August 2022 has been addressed. The

Pupil Premium Students on the Formal curriculum in Autumn 2022 has been addressed. There was a +12% increase of students on the Semi-Formal pathway meeting or exceeding expected progress in Personal Development in the Summer Term.

The data on both curriculum pathways shows that strategies put in place through our Pupil Premium Strategy is having a significant impact on outcomes for children.

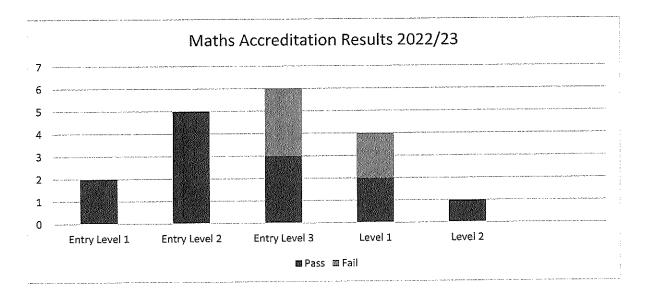

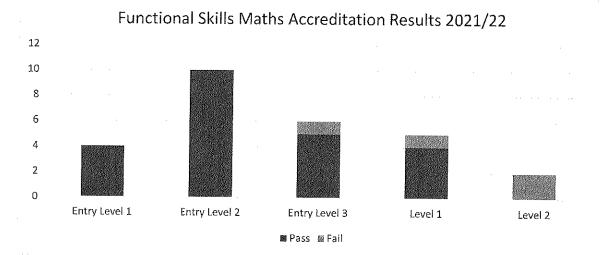

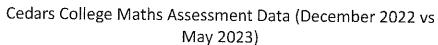

- Of the six students who failed Entry Level 3 and Level 1 exams in 2022/23, five had attendance below 80% across the academic year.
- One student had only studied Entry Level 3 for one year and found the step up from Entry Level 2
 particularly difficult. They will re-sit Entry Level 3 in the 2023/24 academic year.
- Of the two students who failed the Level 1 exam, attendance was particularly low, with one student only studying the content for one year having passed Entry Level in Year 12.

Assessment Data Notes:

- 97% (May 2023) of all students meeting or exceeding expectations (95.2% December 2022);

Communication

Overview:

We improved all aspects of reading within College with focus on the following:

- How Reading levels are assessed.
- How Reading levels can improve within college.
- How to increase Reading for Pleasure.

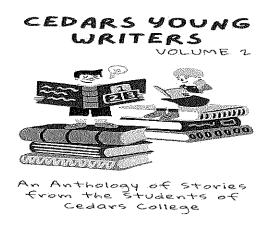
One of the ways we have worked towards improvements, was to introduce an effective and accurate reading age assessment, called the Salford Reading Assessment. Students now have an accurate reading age which can be used to inform students and parents about appropriate materials suitable to their age and ability. It was also informative to recognise which class texts were most appropriate and how to effectively differentiate for the reading age spread across the groups. Recommended reading lists were made available to parents and carers during consultations to support home learning or suggestions for appropriate home reading.

Reading progress is determined through three assessments. Assessment one is completed. Assessment two is due before Christmas and three before the end of the academic year. To determine the effectiveness of the Improving Reading strategy these assessments must be completed.

The reading scores in the Functional English Accreditations are always an area of strength; we must continue to develop the area of reading in order to maintain this high standard.

Students across college submitted stories for the Cedars Young Writers book which is available to purchase on Amazon. This is a wonderful way to celebrate their writing skills by featuring them as published writers. This is something we hope to do at least annually.

In summer 2023, 17 young people were registered on SETPD qualification. I was claimed, I was withdrawn, leaving a predicted 94.10% success rate.

Entry level 2 - 14 learners are registered. Due to current issues with attendance of some students, there is a predicted pass rate of 85.7% on the course.

Entry level 3-9 learners are registered, 4 are continuing with the course in to the next academic year, with a predicted pass rate of 44.4%.

Beliefs and Values

Entry level 3-23 learners were registered, 18 were claimed in summer 2023, 5 were withdrawn, giving a current success rate of 78.3% on the course.

Level I Beliefs and Values - I student was registered, I was claimed, giving 100% pass rate.

Independent living skills

Entry level 2 – 5 learners were registered, 5 learners achieved their qualifications, giving 100% pass rate. Entry level 3 – 8 learners were registered for claiming next academic year so therefore current 100% predicted pass rate.

Entry level ICT

6 learners were registered, I was claimed in summer 2023, 5 learners are continuing with the course in the next academic year. This gives a current success rate of 16.7% with a predicted success rate for summer 2024 of 100%.

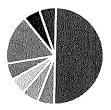

We are still preparing the majority of our young people for progression onto Stage 2 of the Project Choice programme at Gateshead College, Baltic Campus. This stage of the programme is also known as supported internship, and there is an expectation that learners are ready for employment. It is generally assumed, that young people able to directly progress to Stage 2 of Project Choice can function within a workplace setting for up to 4 days per week. It is therefore of paramount importance, that we secure meaningful workplace encounters for our young people at the earliest possible opportunity within Cedars College to give our young people the best head start for their futures.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

Most of the academy trust's income is obtained from the Department of Education (DfE) via the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) in the form of recurrent grants and Local Authorities (LA) in the form of top up funding and fixed costs. The use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the DfE/ESFA/LA during the year ended 31 August 2023 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The academy trust also received grants for fixed assets from the DfE/ESFA. In accordance with the Charities Statement of Recommended practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP 2015), such grants are shown under the Statement of Financial Activities as restricted income in the fixed asset fund. The restricted fixed asset fund balance is reduced by annual depreciation charges over the expected useful life of the assets concerned.

During the year ended 31 August 2023 total expenditure of £4,738,000 was in excess of recurrent grant funding from DfE/ESFA/LA together with other incoming resources. The excess of income over expenditure for the year (excluding pension reserve movements and restricted fixed asset funds) was £298,000.

All of the expenditure shown in the Statement of Financial Activities is in furtherance of the academy trust's objectives.

At 31 August 2023, net book value of fixed assets was £4,892,000 and movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in note 12 to the Financial Statements. The assets were used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the students of the academy trust.

The provisions of Financial Reporting Standard (FRS) 102 have been applied in full in respect of LGPS pension scheme, resulting in a no surplus or deficit recognised on the Balance Sheet.

The academy trust held fund balances as at 31 August 2023 of £5,873,000 comprising £914,000 of restricted general funds, £4,892,000 of restricted fixed asset funds, and £67,000 of unrestricted funds.

Investment Policy and Objectives

The academy trust has an approved Investment Policy and if the Academy is able to generate better returns than currently provided in the deposit account, it may undertake other investments. All investments, outside of the deposit account, will be made on a risk-averse basis, taking ethical considerations into account and need Board of trustee's approval.

The aim of this policy is to ensure that funds which the academy does not immediately need to cover anticipated expenditure are invested in such a way as to maximise the school's income but without risk. Our aim is to spend the publicly funded monies with which we are entrusted for the direct education benefit of students as soon as is prudent. The academy does not consider the investment of surplus funds as a primary activity, rather it is the result of best practice as and when circumstances allow.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves Policy

The academy trust holds restricted and unrestricted funds (the attached financial statements detail these funds). Unrestricted funds are held:

- To provide funds which can be designated to specific areas such as rolling program investment in repairs and maintenance and building improvements
- To cover ongoing costs in relation to the running of the academy trust including catering provisions, school trips and uniform costs

The level of reserves is reviewed by trustees regularly throughout the year. The minimum level of reserves for the ongoing needs of the academy trust is reviewed by the trustees on an annual basis.

The Governing Body will ensure that the levels of reserves that can be carried forward at the end of the financial period will be in line with the guidance received from the DfE on the treatment of General Annual Grant [GAG] income and other grants. The Governing Body will consider the improvement plan for capital developments required.

The Governing Body will always try to match income with expenditure in the current period and will only carry forward reserves that it considers are necessary for future period's expenditure. The Governing Body may accumulate reserve funds raised from private sources to defray for the benefit of the Academy in future years.

As at 31 August 2023 the academy trust holds available reserves of £954,000, comprising of restricted general funds (excluding pension reserves) of £891,000 and unrestricted funds of £63,000.

The trustees continue to consider additional activities related to the academy trust's objectives to which the excess reserves may be applied including:

- a) Development of an additional site at Key stage 4/5 to facilitate the delivery of a vocational curriculum to enhance the opportunities for young people with additional needs in Gateshead.
- b) To expand and develop the hydropool area at Cedars School site.

In addition a designated fund has been established for an equal pay provision. It is intended to increase this in line with any compensation claims received.

The Academy considers it prudent to hold £100,000 of free unrestricted reserves to cover unforeseen costs.

Going Concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the board of trustees has a reasonable expectation that the academy has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies note of the financial statements.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The academy trust was incorporated on 3 August 2012 and is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity, 8168042. The company commenced operation as an Academy on I September 2012. The Charitable Company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the academy trust. The articles of association require the members of the Charitable Company to be responsible for the statutory and constitutional affairs of the charitable company and management of the academy trust.

The governors act as trustees for the charitable activities of The Cedars Academy Trust and are also known as the directors of the Charitable Company for the purposes of company law. The Charitable Company is known as The Cedars Academy Trust.

Details of the trustees who served throughout the period between I September 2022 and 31 August 2023, except as noted, are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on Page 1.

Members' Liability

Each member of the academy trust undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10 for the debts and liabilities contracted before they cease to be a member.

Trustees' Indemnities

Subject to the provisions of the Companies Act 2006 every trustee or other officer or auditor of the academy trust shall be indemnified out of the assets of the Special academy trust against any liability incurred by him in that capacity in defending any proceedings, whether civil or criminal, in which judgment is given in favour or in which he is acquitted or in connection with any application in which relief is granted to him by the court from liability for negligence, default, breach of duty or breach of trust in relation to the affairs of the academy trust.

Method of Recruitment and Appointment or Election of Trustees

Membership is determined in accordance with the composition set out in the memorandum and articles. This states that the academy trust composition is comprised as follows:

The number of trustees shall be not less than three but (unless otherwise determined by ordinary resolution) shall not be subject to any maximum.

Subject to Articles 48-49 and 64, the academy trust shall have the following trustees:

- Up to 10 trustees, appointed under Article 50;
- Any Staff trustees, if appointed under Article 50A;
- Up to 1 LA Governor if appointed under Article 51;
- a minimum of 2 Parent trustees appointed under Articles 53-58;
- the Headteacher;
- up to 3 Co-opted trustees if appointed under Article 59;
- any Additional trustees, if appointed under Article 62, 62A or 68A;
- any Further trustees, if appointed under Article 63 or Article 68A; and
- The Special academy trust may also have any Co-opted Governor appointed under Article 59.

Future trustees shall be appointed or elected, as the case may be, under these Articles. Where it is not possible for such a trustees to be appointed or elected due to the fact that an academy trust has not yet been established or the Headteacher has not been appointed, then the relevant Article or part thereof shall not apply.

Appointment of Trustees

- The Members may appoint up to 10 trustees.
- The Members may appoint Staff trustees through such process as they may determine, provided that the total number of trustees (including the Principal) who are employees of the Special Academy Trust does not exceed one third of the total number of trustees.
- The Principal shall be treated for all purposes as being an ex officio trustee.
- Subject to Article 57, the Parent trustees shall be elected by parents of registered pupils at the Academy. A
 Parent trustee must be a parent of a pupil at the academy trust at the time when he is elected.

Co-opted Trustees

The trustees may appoint up to 3 Co-opted trustees. A 'Co-opted trustee' means a person who is appointed to be a trustee by being Co-opted by trustees who have not themselves been so appointed. The trustees may not co-opt an employee of the Special academy trust as a Co-opted trustee if thereby the number of trustees who are employees of the academy trust would exceed one third of the total number of trustees (including the Principal).

The term of office for any trustee shall be 4 years, save that this time limit shall not apply to the Principal. Subject to remaining eligible to be a particular type of trustee, any trustee may be re-appointed or re-elected.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational Structure

The academy trust's unified management structure consists of the trustees and the Senior Leadership Group [SLG], defined within three main sub committees; Curriculum and Pupils, Finance & Staffing and Business & Partnership Development Group.

The trustees are responsible for determining general policy, adopting an annual School Improvement Plan following a self-evaluation review, monitoring the practices and procedures adopted by the Special academy trust, determining strategic direction of the academy trust, capital expenditure and senior staff appointments.

The SLG consists of the Principal, Assistant Principal (AHT) Teaching & Learning KS1&2, AHT Teaching & Learning KS3&4, AHT Quality of Education, AHT Post 16/Business Partnership and Development Manager (BPDM), AHT Access to Learning (x2 PT posts).

The SLG controls the academy trust at an executive level, implementing the policies laid down by the trustees and reporting back to them. The SLG and trustees are responsible for the agreement of spending with agreed budgets and appointment of staff as stated in the finance handbook.

The academy trust is responsible for the management of the financial systems and ensuring efficient and effective use of resources. The Principal is responsible for the authorisation of spending up to agreed limits as stated in the Financial Handbook. The academy trust Staffing and Facilities Manager is responsible for the efficient operation of the school office.

Arrangements for Setting Pay and Remuneration of Key Management Personnel

The Board of Trustees will determine those posts that have substantial strategic responsibilities for school leadership. These will comprise the Senior Leadership Group and include the Principal, Assistant Principal(s) and School Improvement Teacher (SIT) Leads (Teaching and Learning Responsibilities (TLR) holders, Middle Management).

The Finance and Staffing Committee will establish, and recommend to the whole Governing Body for approval, the appropriate pay ranges for members of their Senior Leadership Group. The pay award must be in line with the academy trust's Pay and Conditions document.

Policies and Procedures for the Induction and Training of New Trustees

The training and induction provided for new trustees depends on their existing experience. Where necessary induction and training is provided on charity, educational, legal and financial matters. All new trustees are given a tour of the academy trust and the chance to meet with staff and students. All trustees are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budgets, plans and other documents that they will need to undertake their role as trustees.

FINANCIAL AND RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

The trustees recognise that the LGPS pension deficit, which is set in the pension note 19, represents a significant liability. However, the trustees consider that the academy trust is able to meet its liabilities in respect of paying its annual contributions for the foreseeable future, and the risk from this liability is minimised.

Purposes

- To ensure adequate cash balances are maintained in the current account to cover day to day working capital requirements
- · To ensure there is limited risk of loss in the capital value of any cash funds invested
- To protect the capital value of any invested funds against inflation
- To optimise returns on invested funds

Regular cash flows are prepared and monitored to ensure there are adequate funds to meet all payroll related commitments and outstanding creditors that are due for payment. Where the cash flow identifies a base level of cash funds that will be surplus to requirements these may be invested only with Lloyds Bank who are the current banking providers for the school. The Academy Business & Partnership Development Manager will seek approval from the Finance & Staffing Committee (F&S) before investing such funds and will provide a statement on any monies invested to the F&S Committee at their regular termly meetings. Periodically (at least every 3 months) the Academy Business & Partnership Development Manager will review the interest rates being achieved and will compare with other investment opportunities to ensure the investment funds are delivering value for money.

The Chief Financial Officer shall take independent financial advice for any fixed term investment for a period longer than six months in line with the Articles of Association 5 (m) and (n) and observe any guidance in the Academies Financial Handbook. In addition, these investments shall be restricted to ones that guaranteed return of capital rather than any equity-based investment. All investments must be authorised by either the Chief Executive or the Chief Financial Officer.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The principal risks and uncertainties are centred on changes in the level of funding from DfE/ESFA. In addition, the academy trust is a member of the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS), which results in the recognition of a significant deficit on the academy trust Balance Sheet.

The trustees have assessed the major risks, to which the academy trust is exposed, in particular those relating specifically to teaching provision of facilities and other operational areas of the academy trust, and its finances. The trustees have implemented a number of systems to assess risks that the school faces, especially in the operational areas (e.g. in relation to teaching, health and safety, bullying and school visits) and in relation to the control of finance. Where significant financial risk still remains they have ensured they have adequate insurance cover. The academy trust has an effective system of internal financial controls and this is explained in more detail in the Governance Statement.

The academy trust has fully implemented the requirements of the Safe Recruitment procedures and all staff have received training in this area in addition to training on Child Protection.

The academy trust is subject to a number of risks and uncertainties in common with other academies. The academy trust has in place procedures to identify and mitigate financial risks.

The academy trust maintains a risk register which is reviewed by the Health & Safety Officer to ensure that satisfactory arrangements are in place to manage risk. There is an annual review of all risk management issues led by various staff e.g. Principal, Health & Safety Officer and Administration and Facilities Manager as well as teaching staff; there is ongoing review in response to situations or new legislation or information.

The academy trust considers all risks and the trustees have implemented a number of systems to access risks that may impact the academy trust, particularly operational areas, e.g. in relation to teaching, management of IT security, safeguarding, health & safety, including educational visits and in relation to the control of finance. The trustees are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to major risk.

AUDITOR

So far as the trustees are aware, there is no relevant information (as defined by Section 418 of the Companies Act 2006) of which the academy trust's auditors are unaware, and each trustee has taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as a trustee in order to make them aware of any audit information and to establish that the academy trust's auditors are aware of that information.

Review of Value for Money

As accounting officer the Principal has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes, as well as state safety and management, achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The accounting officer considers how the academy trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the Board of trustees where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where appropriate. The accounting officer for the academy trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by obtaining quotes from at least 3 professionals before work is carried out.

The Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in The Cedars Academy Trust for the period I September 2022 to 31 August 2023 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to Handle Risk

The board of trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the academy trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of trustees is of the view that there is a formal on-going process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of trustees.

The Risk and Control Framework

The academy trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of trustees.
- regular reviews by the finance and general purposes committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes.
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance.
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines.
- identification and management of risks.

The board of trustees has decided to buy-in an internal audit service from Inspire Compliance Limited. This option has been chosen to provided independence from the external auditors.

The internal auditor's role includes giving advice on financial and other matters and performing a range of checks on the academy trust's financial and other systems. In particular, the checks carried out in the current period included:

- testing of procurement processes.
- testing of control account/bank reconciliations.
- testing of other financial systems.

On an annual basis, the auditor reports to the board of trustees, through the audit and risk committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the board of trustees' financial responsibilities and annually prepares an annual summary report to the committee outlining the areas reviewed, key findings, recommendations and conclusions to help the committee consider actions and assess year on year progress.

Review of Effectiveness

- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit; or
- the trustees were not entitled to take advantage of the small companies exemption from the requirement to prepare a Strategic Report or in preparing the Report of the Trustees.

Responsibilities of trustees

As explained more fully in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities, the trustees (who are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the trustees determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are responsible for assessing the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the trustees either intend to liquidate the academy trust or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Our responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue a Report of the Independent Auditors that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. Our audit must be alert to the risk of manipulation of the financial statements and seek to understand the incentives and opportunities for management to achieve this.

We undertake the following procedures to identify and respond to these risks of non-compliance:

- Understanding the key legal and regulatory frameworks that are applicable to the Trust. We communicated
 identified laws and regulations throughout the audit team and remained alert to any indications of
 noncompliance throughout the audit. We determined the most significant of these to be the regulations set out
 by the DfE/ESFA. Our audit focuses on financial matters as set out in our regularity opinion. Other key laws
 and regulations included safeguarding, Health & Safety, GDPR and employment law
- Enquiry of trustees and management as to policies and procedures to ensure compliance and any known instances of non-compliance
- Review of board minutes and correspondence with regulators
- Enquiry of trustees and management as to areas of the financial statements susceptible to fraud and how these risks are managed
- Challenging management on key estimates, assumptions and judgements made in the preparation of the financial statements. These key areas of uncertainty are disclosed in the accounting policies
- Identifying and testing unusual journal entries, with a particular focus on manual journal entries.
 Through these procedures, we did not become aware of actual or suspected non-compliance.

We planned and performed our audit in accordance with auditing standards but owing to the inherent limitations of procedures required in these areas, there is an unavoidable risk that we may not have detected a material misstatement in the accounts. The further removed non-compliance with laws and regulations is from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, the less likely we would become aware of it. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement due to fraud is higher than the risk of not detecting one resulting from error, as fraud may involve concealment, collusion, forgery, misrepresentations, or override of internal controls. We are not responsible for preventing non-compliance and cannot be expected to detect non-compliance with all laws and regulations.

I. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the academy trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)(Charities SORP (FRS 102))', the Academies Accounts Direction 2022 to 2023 issued by the ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

The Cedars Academy Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Going concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate, i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the charitable company to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the accounts and have concluded that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern. Thus, they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the academy trust has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Sponsorship income

Sponsorship income provided to the academy trust which amounts to a donation is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which it is receivable (where there are no performance-related conditions), where it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

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Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 August 2023

I. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance related conditions), where it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Other income

Other income including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the academy trust has provided the goods or services.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Goods donated for resale are included at fair value, being the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale. If it is practical to assess the fair value at receipt, it is recognised in stock and 'Income from other trading activities'. Upon sale, the value of the stock is charged against 'Income from other trading activities' and the proceeds are recognised as 'Income from other trading activities'. Where it is impractical to fair value the items due to the volume of low value items they are not recognised in the financial statements until they are sold. This income is recognised within 'Income from other trading activities'.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities are incurred on the academy trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy trust apportioned to charitable activities.

Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land and assets under construction, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life, as follows:

Tangible fixed assets

- Freehold buildings:	20 years
- Fixtures and fittings:	4 years
- Plant and machinery:	2 to 4 years
- Motor vehicles:	4 years

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Financial instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 14. Prepayments are not financial instruments. Amounts due to the charity's wholly owned subsidiary are held at face value less any impairment.

Cash at bank- is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 15. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument. Amounts due to charity's wholly owned subsidiary are held at face value less any impairment.

Taxation

The academy trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph i Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the academy trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by chapter 3 part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the academy trust. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 August 2023

I. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. As stated in the pension notes, the TPS is a multi-employer scheme and there is insufficient information available to use defined benefit accounting. The TPS is therefore treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions are recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the statement of financial activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

2. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

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Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 August 2023

2. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY - continued

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in notes to the accounts, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore, a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2022 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2023. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability. The original Local Government Pension scheme valuation showed an asset of £543,000. That asset valuation is highly dependent on a number of assumptions and does not represent the future value of benefits to the trust. As a result, the Trustees have considered the potential benefits to the trust. On the basis that the future value of employer contributions in respect of future service cost (£183,000) exceed the employer future service costs (£178,000) combined with the fact that the last Local Government Scheme actuarial review set the contribution rates from 1 April 2023 and that these will not be revised until April 2026 the Trustees have decided to include the pension asset at £NIL.

Goodwin

The case related to male spouse or civil partner of a female member is treated in the same way as a same-sex spouse or civil partner. Survivor benefits will be calculated using service from I April 1972, or 6 April 1978 if the marriage or civil partnership took place after the last day of pensionable service. This change will apply for deaths in respect of female members which occurred from 5 December 2005, which is the date that same-sex civil partnerships were introduced. This case was brought against the Teachers' Pension Scheme. Actuaries have estimated that the impact of Goodwin indexation to be less than 0.1% of total liabilities. Based on this estimate it would increase liabilities by £3,000 which has been assessed to be immaterial to the financial statements.

18. PENSION AND SIMILAR OBLIGATIONS

The academy trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by South Tyneside Council. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016 and of the LGPS to the period ended 31 March 2022.

Contributions amounting to £61,000 were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2023 (2022 - £55,000) and are included within creditors.

Teachers' pension scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the teachers' pension scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019. The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levy)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218,100 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £22,000 million
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. The assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from I April 2023.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the period amounted to £356,000 (2022 - £326,000).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local government pension scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2023 was £262,000 (2022 - £210,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £188,000 (2022 - £152,000). and employees' contributions totalled £74,000 (2022 - £58,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 14.1% for employers and 5.5 to 12% for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of an academy trust closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.
